



*Professor Lawrence A. Tritle, Ph.D*

Lawrence Tritle is Daum Professor of History, 2012, at Loyola Marymount University. He has taught at LMU since 1978, and has served as head of his department and chair of several university committees. He was also a recipient of the Rains Award for Research and Scholarship in 2014.

Tritle is trained in the field of ancient history (Ph.D., University of Chicago, 1978). He has published widely. Among his books are “From Melos to My Lai: War and Survival” (2000), “A New History of the Peloponnesian War” (2010), and “The Oxford Handbook of Warfare in the Classical World” (edited with Brian Campbell, 2013).

Tritle’s research interests focus on the experience of war, investigating how war affects not only the individuals who fight, but also the wider impact of violence on culture and society. This is the topic of his next book, “A New History of War.”

He has served in several professional organizations including the Society of Classical Studies (formerly the American Philological Association) as chair of the Committee on Ancient History, and the Friends of Ancient History.

A combat veteran of the Vietnam War (1<sup>st</sup> LT, Infantry, U.S. Army), Tritle served from May 1970 to March 1971 as an adviser with the Mobile Advisory Team 50, Ba Xuyen province, IV Corps [Mekong Delta], supporting South Vietnamese forces in ground operations. His decorations include the Combat Infantrymen’s Badge, Bronze Star, and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry.
